- Be affected by a financial hardship due to COVID-19.
- Have an unpaid balance on charges between April 1, 2020 and Sept. 30, 2021.

If you choose to provide proof of income, you could qualify for even more than \$700 through other need-based assistance programs.

Whack Weeds the Old-Fashioned Way

If you're thinking about running to the garden center for something to rid your yard of recently thriving weeds, don't. "Weed and feed" products will not help your situation now. In fact, the fertilizer will only bolster the weeds and likely make your situation worse.

The solution: good, old-fashioned elbow grease.

Pulling out individual weeds like thistle is very effective, especially when soils are

moist after a rain. Wear thick garden gloves for protection and pull gently from the base of the weed.

If you see what looks like clover in the grass or bedding areas, try chopping off the top with a weed eater or hoe. Then apply a fresh layer of mulch on top to discourage regrowth.

In areas where your turf did not have a chance to recover from drought before the cold weather crept in, mow the weeds regularly to keep them from going to seed.



A-Tunneling WeWill Go

In the wee morning hours of Dec. 16, a giant boring machine completed a 12-foot tunnel spanning about three miles along Military Drive from Old Pearsall Road to U.S. Highway 90. It's the longest tunnel segment of SAWS' massive sewer replacement project near Joint Base San Antonio-Lackland. Only half a mile of tunneling — more than 100 feet underground to avoid disrupting traffic and military activity — remains on the project, which is expected to be completed in 2023.

The City of San Antonio Is Here To Help: Understanding Your Flood Risk

Do you know if the area you live in is prone to flooding? The City of San Antonio Public Works Department can help you determine if your area is at risk.

Using the Federal Emergency Management Agency's flood insurance rate maps, Public Works can show you basic flood information including flood zones and other flood information such as local drainage, depths of flooding, special flood-related hazards in different parts of the city and historical flood data. They can also share with you the areas of town that provide natural floodplain ecosystem functions and do not impede the flow of water.

If flood water affects your property, Public Works can investigate the problem and give property protection advice or send someone to investigate the problem on your property and offer possible solutions.

También pueden compartir con usted las áreas de la ciudad que proporcionan funciones de ecosistemas de llanuras de inundación naturales y no impiden el flujo de agua.

Si tu propiedad es impactada por la lluvia, el departamento de Obras Públicas puede investigar el problema y brindarte consejos y ofreser soluciones sobre como protejer tu propiedad.
