Help your landscape fend off a freeze

It may be February, but we're not out of the woods yet when it comes to freezing temperatures.

Healthy, well-adapted plants in the ground with well-developed root systems stand a great chance of recovering after a frost — if they're properly protected.

Soft, woody plants, active bloomers and potted plants tend to be most vulnerable.

- Relocate potted plants to a protected/sheltered space.



- Drape in-ground plants and shrubs with any fabric covering — bed sheets, blankets, burlap or newspaper — to allow moisture to escape and keep cold air out.

- Cover smaller, low-to-the-ground plants with newspaper or small "volcanoes" of mulch or leaves.

Avoid using plastic as a covering. It doesn't insulate or breathe well and can trap moisture, compounding the freezing problem.

Remember to remove coverings promptly after the freeze has passed.

Fix a Leak Week is March 16-22

Fix a Leak Week doesn't officially roll around until March, but the time is always right to fix leaks!

You may be walking past a hidden leak every day and not realize it. Most fixes are simple, like swapping out a toilet flapper, or adjusting a sprinkler head that's spraying the sidewalk instead of your yard. These small repairs help your home run more efficiently, keep your landscape healthier, and most importantly save water.



Consider these culprits:

- **Leaking toilets**
- **Sprinkler systems** (that are not turned off)
- **Water softener tanks** recharging daily

Listen for hissing or dripping as you move about your house and yard. Never ignore those sounds as they can alert you to a leak. Visit saws.org/leak for help solving a high-water-use mystery.

The challenge, which started in 2016 and became an international event in 2018, encourages people to document nature to better understand urban biodiversity. Cities across the globe compete to see who can log the most observations, find the most species and have the most participants. You can help San Antonio rank among the top cities!
